We live in what is undoubtedly a small village yet it is one with a big heart, and in the middle of the village there are a huddle of buildings including the old school, the Wykes Room and the Green Room and the Memorial Hall all around the village green.

It would probably be enough if we just looked after these buildings and put on the occasional social event but the fact is there is always a lot going on in, and around, Ashley Green. So? Where to start?

The local football team, the old Kolsassians are very keen to return to the village and to use the playing field. However, they are struggling to create a working group to drive the project forward. 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The Community Association has covered the cost of the work to erect the fencing, and Matthew Rance (one time resident here) of **Wood Image**, was commissioned to do it.



News from St. John's - Full Frontal

Over the years, I have come to know a number of kind people in the area and so felt neither a stranger nor merely a visitor when, on 10th July, I joined the congregation at St. John's, Ashley Green, for a rather special Sunday morning church service.

The Holy Communion service was the platform - the vehicle - for the formal dedication of two gifts: one to the church and the other to the whole Ashley Green community.



A beautiful copper beech has been planted on the green in memory of Vivienne Withall - and we continued singing our hymn of praise as we left the church (and the safety of the organ accompaniment !) to gather outside to acknowledge the new focal point on the green.

Inside, St. John's was resplendent with the colourful vibrancy of the new altar frontal and accompanying suite of church vestments for use during the Trinity term. The suite has been given by Geoff Sheppard in memory of his late wife, my very dear sister, Hilary, who supported and enlivened the Church locally and in the wider diocesan arena and who was particularly keen to see women exercising a more influential role in Church affairs.

The design for the altar frontal was originated by a project group led by Rev. Hilary Wilson and including Barbara Young, Hilary Haworth and Geoff. The work was carried out by a textile designer, Juliet Hemingray and her company, specialising in ecclesiastical vestments.

Thanks to the efforts of Barbara Young, who took over the project leadership while Hilary Wilson was recuperating from an operation, the delivery logistics (trickier than anticipated) were successfully sorted out and everything arrived in the special transport, as planned and agreed, on Friday, 8th July.

At the outset, I had seen and really liked the proposed design for the new frontal but it did not do full justice to the finished article. The colourful, yet delicate, interweaving of flowers and leaves intentionally reflects the Chilterns summer countryside which Hilary loved so much and also echoes the colours of the stained glass windows at the east end of the church above the altar. The music embroidered below the frontal's central design is of the opening bars of the beautiful Welsh tune, Blaenwern, frequently used for the hymn "Love Divine all Loves Excelling" - one of Hilary's favourites.

It is certain that the new vestments will be a central part and focal point of the St John's services for many, many years to come.

The Way We Were

Back in 2008 we ran a very interesting article about life in Ashley Green during the war, interviewing two ex pupils from way back - one a villager and one an evacuee - who came up to the old school to reminisce with our roving reporter!

We have been contacted by another evacuee who found our website and got in touch, and has sent the following to take us back to that time. We asked the two pupils if they remembered this chap, but sadly not.

“I'm not surprised I am not remembered since I arrived during 1940 at the tender age of 4 - a very young lad. For the next maybe two or three years on and off we lived at “The Beeches” Two Dells Lane, travelling back to South East London on occasion to ensure our house was still there. Later during the war I was evacuated to Bridlington Yorkshire, and finished up at Herne Bay Kent. While I was at Ashley Green I did attend school there.

Here is a little piece I wrote mainly for my grandson who asked what I did in the war, and thought it was so long ago that I was talking about the Zulu wars!!

The year - 1940. Location - A village on the outskirts of Chesham, Buckinghamshire, England.

Imagine if you will a dark country lane, a 4 year old wide eyed boy David clutching his mothers hand, imagination running wild as the moon emerged from behind the scurrying clouds, the silhouettes of the trees and bushes giving the appearance of witches and monsters, he was comforted in the fact that ahead of them was Grandad Thomas.

He and his mother had left their home in Catford, South East London due to the outbreak of war with Germany, to the safety of the country. His father, George, had rejoined the Royal Air Force and a Mr. & Mrs. Gurd had offered the couple a home for the duration. How we ever got to know them is still to this day a mystery to me, I can only assume they were acquaintances of my Grandad.

As we walked along, from the darkness ahead we heard what could only be described as “Scrape and tap!” and that was followed by “AnybodyThere?”

A long coated figure emerged, limping with a stick for support, to our relief it was Mr. Gurd looking for us.

He led us back to “The Beeches”, a bungalow, which I am told he built himself. There Mrs. Gurd welcomed us to the first of our three evacuation addresses.

I recall that bungalow, built on blocks, the peach tree by the front gate, the outside toilet which was at the side of the building reached by a short path about two feet wide, and if you strayed off the path you would fall into the deep dell. (wooded hollow) But for me the most exiting thing was to walk down the lane and finding windfall apples, a great prize.

When my Mother died, I found this address “The Beeches” Two Dells Lane. Ashley Green, among her possessions. I could only assume this was where we were evacuated.

Therefore on the 29th August 1995 my wife and I went in search of the bungalow. We found Two Dells Lane but not “The Beeches”

We made enquiries as to where it may be and a gentleman we spoke to told us that we couldn't be much closer to it. He pointed to some trees and bushes at the side of the lane.

“Go through there” he said. This we did. With difficulty we pushed aside the overgrown bushes, and there it was, the bungalow on blocks. Sadly to say in ruins and uninhabitable, and we went inside. There was the sitting room where I used to tear my grandfathers tobacco into strips for his pipe, and going outside, there was the toilet and the dell just as I remembered all those years ago....

I am so glad we found it even though it was in such a sorry state, no doubt it has now been demolished now.”


For information, the bungalow is still there - the first house in the row before the prep school, now named Deep Dell - which was rebuilt some time back in the past 12 years.

My previous perceptions of Ashley Green amounted to, firstly, seeing it as one place down on a tortuous trip along the M4 (and invariably the place where the 'Are-we-nearly-there-yets?' began) - and, secondly, knowing that staff meetings from Ashlyns School would be made much more bearable with a bowl of the Golden Eagle's twisty fries!

But now I have been afforded a privileged insight into what a thriving and supportive community this is. There is plenty to do and get involved with, and we are blessed with wonderful facilities in the guise of the communal buildings we have at our disposal. I have met some really great people and been amazed at the number of them who give so much of their time and expertise voluntarily for the good of the village and its community.

Being the lettings Officer is more demanding than I expected it to be, but it is very interesting and has been a brilliant way of getting to know the village and many of its inhabitants.

I must admit, I did have reservations about leaving Berkhamsted, where I had lived for over thirty years of my life, but my five year old son summed up the whole experience of our new village life when he saw a removal van on Chesham Road about a month ago. As we drove past he said, with incredulity, 'but Mummy, why would anyone want to leave Ashley Green?'

Why, indeed...

On May 7th this year the Bishop of Oxford launched the Diocesan Pilgrim Project at a service in Banbury Parish Church attended by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The project is supported by a pilgrimage map of the diocese and drawings of fifteen churches in the diocese drawn by **Brian Hall**, a member of the **Ashley Green Art Group**.

The project is to encourage to people to carry out a pilgrimage to each of the fifteen churches, five in each of the counties comprising the diocese: Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Berkshire.

Copies of the pilgrimage map have been distributed through every church in the diocese, and in each of the churches in the pilgrimage there are leaflets with a copy of the drawing on the front, and containing information about the church which might be of interest to visitors.

Brian was asked to do the drawings when he was sketching during a pilgrimage to the Holy Land led by the Bishop last October.

Originally the drawings were to be completed by September this year, but the Bishop asked if they could be done to present to the Archbishop on his visit to the diocese in May.

This meant Brian had to do the drawings, which are pen and ink and watercolour, from photos he had to take during the inclement weather during February and March.

The original drawings were displayed in Brian's church, St. Michael and All Angels in Amersham on the Hill, in mid October this year



Ashley Green Bat Walk



A large and enthusiastic group of villagers, of all ages, met at the Memorial Hall, an hour before sunset on Friday 23rd September for a Bat Walk led by Peter and Margaret Grimsey and Julie Hopton.

Peter, Margaret and Julie are members of the North Bucks Bat Group and Julie is also a Ranger with High Wycombe Council.

To start us off, Peter showed us some slides while Julie gave a very informative talk about the types of bats found in the United Kingdom.

We learned about their habitat, feeding habits and some background to the law relating to them - bats being a protected species.

Later, armed with 30 or so bat detectors (is that Bat-o-meters?) kindly provided, we ventured out onto Glebe to see what we could find. Initially we were disappointed and didn't pick up any sounds at all, but as we began to move towards the pond and passed underneath the large trees by the playground, our detectors came to life with the location calls and feeding buzzes of the Common Pipistrelle (also known as "45's" from the frequency they register on the detectors).

We had been told that an adult Pipistrelle weighs about 5gms and can live up to 15 years in the wild, and that each bat can consume 3,000 midges or mosquitoes each night. It was an amazing experience standing under the trees being able to listen to them and also see them flitting about above our heads.

A near relative the, Soprano Pipistrelle, has more affinity with water so Peter thinks that the village pond clearance which took place on the 16th October will help this species.

We retired back to the Memorial Hall for hot chocolate and biscuits made in the shape of bats made for us by Margaret Grimsey, these went down so well that Margaret very kindly provided us with her recipe. See it on the village website
